- Attend a cat show and learn the basics of cat showmanship.
- Compare labels on cat foods to make an informed decision on content & price.
- Keep a diary of your cat's health and eating habits.
- Keep records of all costs and

Exploring Depth *Advanced*

- Explore cat training exercises.
- Create a cat ownership budget.
- Volunteer at an ASPCA Adoption Day at your local pet store.
- Talk to an Animal Control Officer about animal cruelty and neglect.
- Understand the role of scientific research in cat husbandry.
